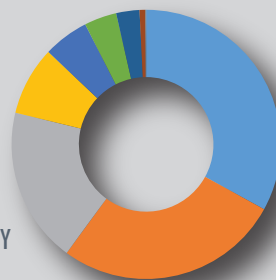

2018 Point in Time (PiT) Count

The Point in Time Count is a non-identifying census to gather demographic information (e.g. age, gender, veteran or Indigenous Status). It is a street count of homelessness at any "point in time" on a specific day within a community.
